



## **COVID-19 LOCAL RESPONSE GRANTS HELPED:**

Get tons and tons of groceries to people across the county.

4,113 Families pay their rent.

Food and rental assistance needs continue to grow.

# We are in this together. But existing inequities create disproportionate impacts in our community.

Weare prioritizing grants to those already disadvantaged by inequities in Santa Cruz County:

- Undocumented and immigrant families
- Low-wage workers
- Black, Indigenous,  $\bullet$ and People of Color
- Fragile seniors
- People with severe illness

### **COVID-19 Racial Disparities:**

- Black and Latinx people are three times as likely to become infected with COVID-19.
- Black and Latinx people are nearly twice as likely to die from COVID-19 as white people.
- In Santa Cruz County Latinx people are 33% of the population and yet make up 50% of the known cases.
- 49% of all cases are in Watsonville, which has a Latinx population of 84%. In Santa Cruz County unemployment was 17% in April, 14% in May. In Watsonville unemployment was at 26% in April, 19% in May.

### **Racial Disparities in Philanthropy:**

Nationally, less than 7% of philanthropic dollars are given to groups led by and for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC).

55% of our COVID Response grants have been given to organizations led by **BIPOC.** 



### FOOD ASSISTANCE

Willy Elliott-McCrea

Second Harvest **Food Bank** Santa Cruz County



- Doubled services overnight when COVID-19 hit.
- Over 23,000 workers lost their jobs, majority are low-income.
- In 3 months, distributed over 3.7 million pounds of food.
- From March June over 118,000 families received food assistance.

- 4-8 youth mental health crisis calls a day. The youngest 8 years old. Number of families requesting care increased by 325%.
- Increased stress and anxiety in youth.
- Exasperating for those already working through existing traumas. Pajaro Valley youth are disproportionately affected by the digital divide.

### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

**Monarch Services** 



- 40% increase in calls to the crisis line.
- 30% increase in new domestic violence clients each week.
- Abuse compounded by increased time spent isolated with partners.
- Social isolation has fractured networks of family or friends that domestic violence survivors rely on for help.
- Domestic Violence survivors are in need of rental assistance and food.

### UNDOCUMENTED COMMUNITY

### Maria Elena de la Garza

Community Action Board of Santa Cruz County



- Undocumented workers in farming, hospitality, restaurants, house cleaners, dayworkers, retail, and childcare faced immediate and dramatic job loss.
- For undocumented people there is no stimulus check, no unemployment insurance, and no traditional rental assistance.
- Our region's Disaster Relief Assistance for Immigrants received 30,000 calls in one day.
- \$20K-\$30K in no-barrier rental assistance given each month during the crisis.

# YOUR GIFTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

- Provided food, household supplies, and PPE. Gave emergency rental and household financial assistance for undocumented individuals and immigrant families.
- Ensured emergency financial assistance for Day Workers.
- Gives vulnerable COVID-19 patients economic support and wage replacement for low income workers.

### CONNECTING FAMILIES TO RESOURCES

Fe Silva-Robles & Nereida Robles

Senderos



- Senderos helped identify the COVID-19 and resource communication gap with Latinx families in Live Oak and Santa Cruz.
- Families are experiencing multiple job losses, reduced wages, and reduced hours.
- Provided 285 families in need of rental assistance in the last three months. Basic needs, mental health, and digital divide impacts on the youth's education.


